

Pressure washing is essential to keep our High Desert community clean and we want to make sure these practices are pollution-free. Water runoff from pressure washing can carry toxic chemicals into storm drains leading to the Mojave River Watershed. So, whether you're pressure washing the outside of a building or cleaning carpets, there's a storwater-savvy way to do it!

- Collect debris and toss it in the trash
- Protect nearby storm drains with sandbags or coverings
- Use biodegradable products
- Secure products in an airtight container to avoid spills
- Use a water shutoff nozzle on the hose to prevent excess runoff
- Invest in a portable vacuum recovery system to safely contain and dispose of water runoff

Dispose of all toxic materials at a Household Hazardous Waste Collection Center.
